An amendment to the Master Plan, Kensington-Wheaton Planning Area VII, 1959, as amended; the Master Plan of Bikeway, 1978, as amended; the Master Plan for Historic Preservation, 1979, as amended; the Functional Master Plan for Conservation and Management in the Rock Creek Basin, Montgomery County, Maryland, 1980; the Master Plan of Highways within Montgomery County, Maryland; and the General Plan for the Physical Development of the Maryland-Washington Regional District.

THE MARYLAND-NATIONAL CAPITAL PARK AND PLANNING COMMISSION

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This Sector Plan, being an amendment to the Master Plan, Kensington-Wheaton Planning Area VII, 1959, as amended; the Master Plan of Bikeways, 1978, as amended; the Master Plan for Historic Preservation, 1979, as amended; the Functional Master Plan for Conservation and Management in the Rock Creek Basin, Montgomery County, Maryland, 1980; the Master Plan of Highways within Montgomery County, Maryland; and the General Plan for the Physical Development of the Maryland-Washington Regional District has been adopted by The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission by Resolution Number 82-21 on July 14, 1982, after a duly advertised Public Hearing held on November 17, 1981, pursuant to the provisions of Article 66D, #7-108, of the Annotated Code of Maryland, 1981, Cumulative Supplement, and has been approved by the Montgomery Council, sitting as the District Council, by Resolution Number 9-1911 on July 6, 1982, after a duly advertised Public Hearing held on June 3, 1982.

The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission

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The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission is a bi-county agency created by the General Assembly of Maryland in 1927. The Commission's geographic authority extends to the great majority of Montgomery and Prince George's Counties: the Maryland-Washington Regional District (M-NCPPC planning jurisdiction) comprises 1,001 square miles, while the Metropolitan District (parks) comprises 919 square miles, in the two Counties.

The Commission has three major functions:

- (1) the preparation, adoption, and from time to time amendment or extension of the General Plan for the physical development of the Maryland-Washington Regional District;
- (2) the acquisition, development, operation, and maintenance of a public park system; and
- (3) in Prince George's County only, the operation of the entire County public recreation program.

The Commission operates in each county through a Planning Board appointed by and responsible to the county government. All local plans, recommendations on zoning amendments, administration of subdivision regulations, and general administration of parks are responsibilities of the Planning Boards.

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
