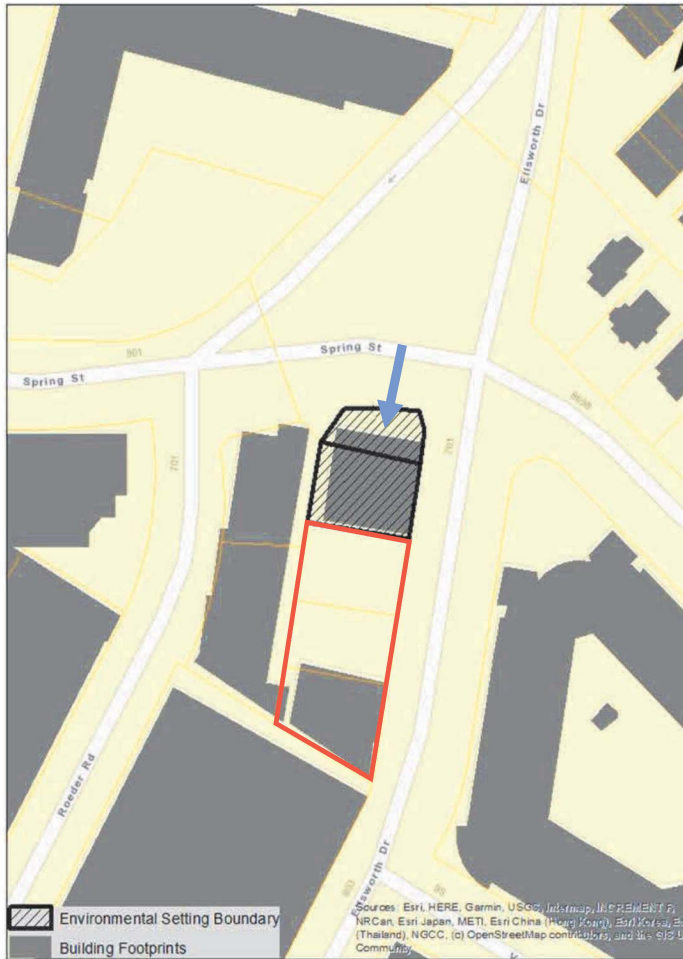

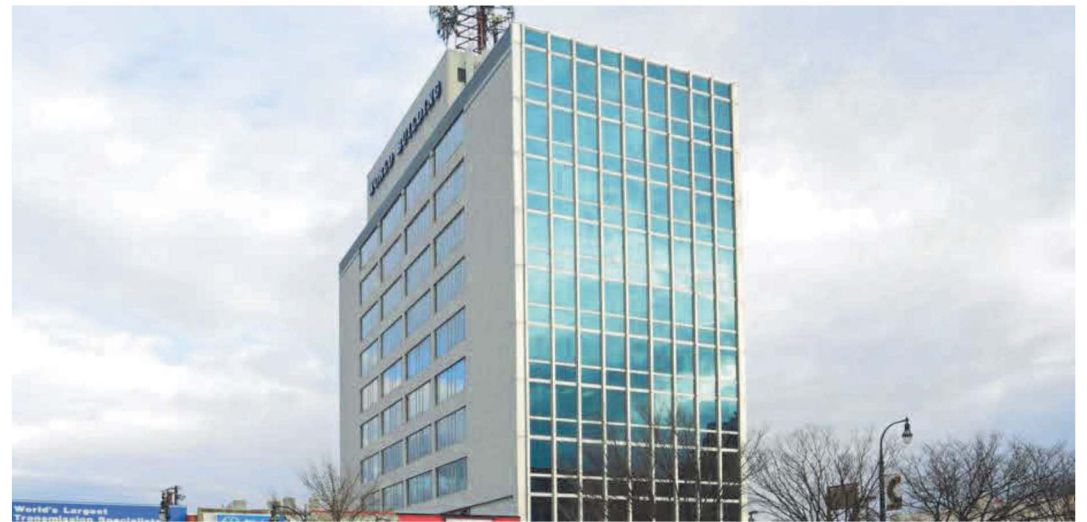

NSGA & NRMCA History

- Organized in 1911 (under a different name); Reorganized as the NSGA in 1923.
- NRMCA organized in 1930.
- Headquarters of both organizations in Washington, D.C. prior to moving to Silver Spring in 1964.
- Associations hire John H. Sullivan, Jr., to design the shared headquarters in Montgomery County.

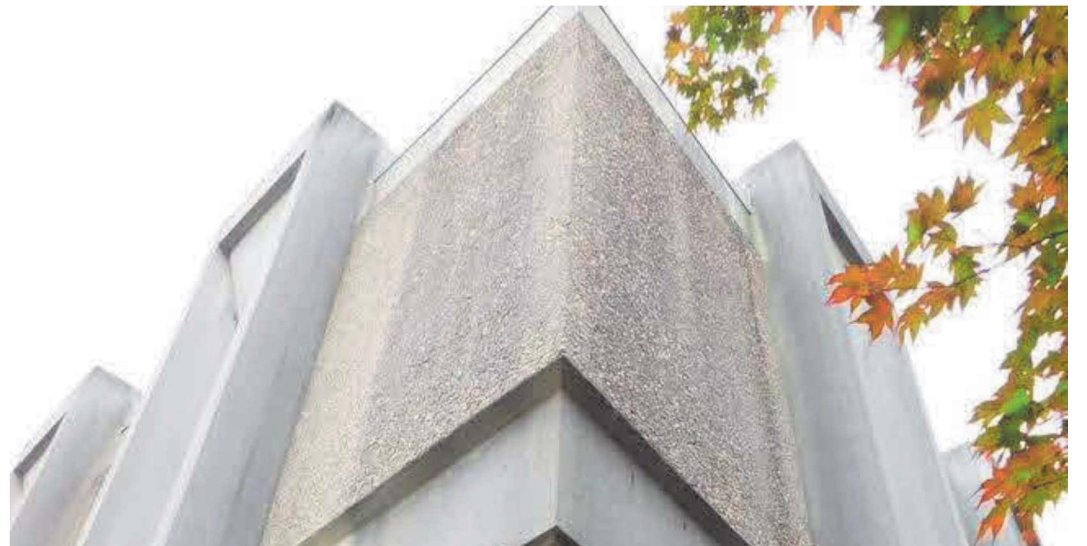
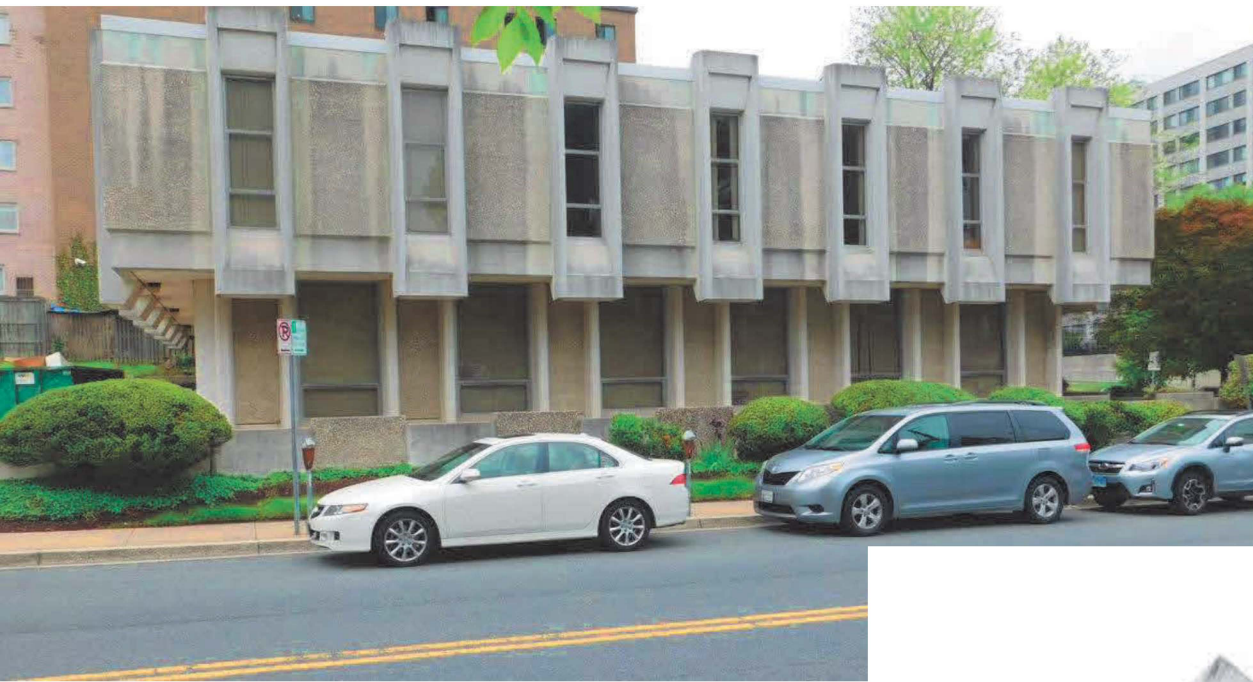
John H. and Joan Marie Sullivan

- Create a presence in a built environment.

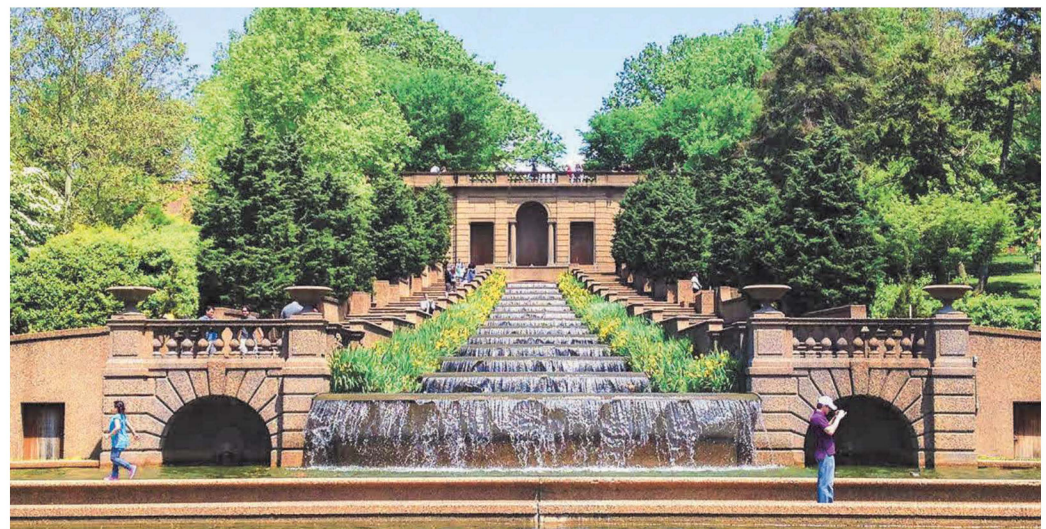
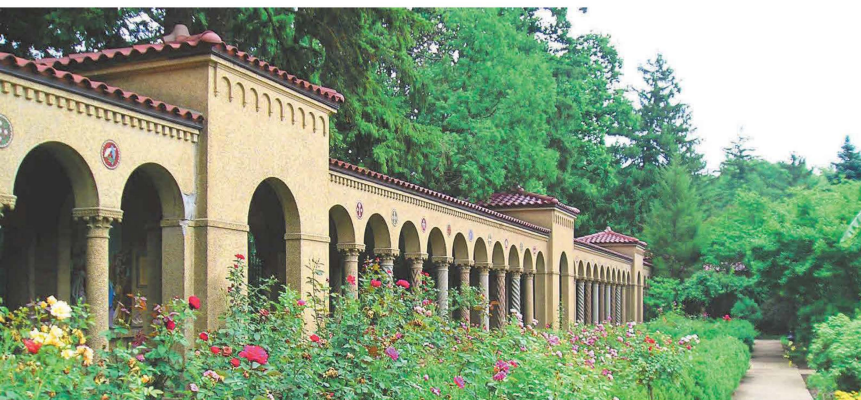
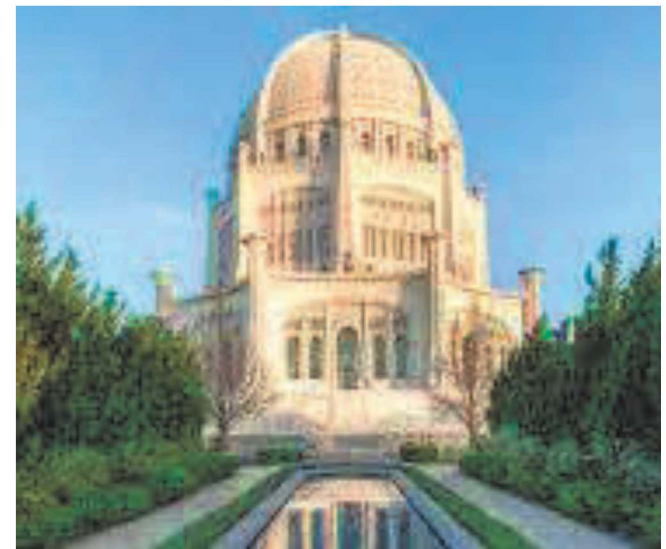

Top Design Awards

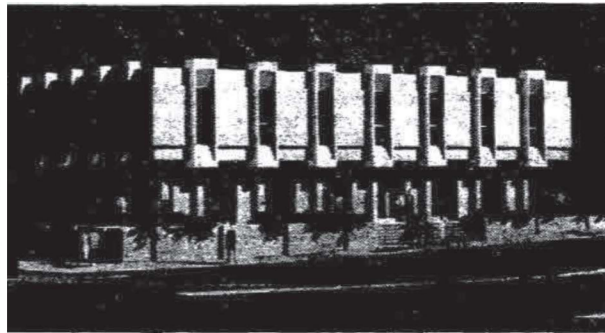
A contemporary style summer home in Riva, Md., near Annapolis has won the top award in the fifth biennial competition of the Potomac Valley Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

Hugh Newell Jacobsen, whose design was judged best in the competition, received the award along with three other first place winners and five award of merit winners at a banquet Wednesday night.

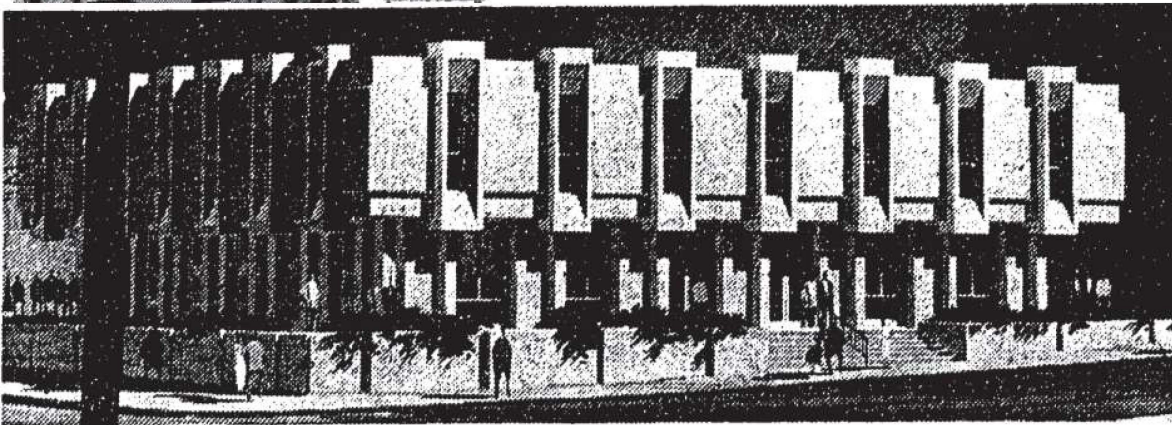
Architects winning other first place awards were Harold Lloyd Eton for a home in Brookeville, Md.; John Henry Sullivan for a headquarters building in Silver Spring, and Cooper & Auerbach for an office building in Washington.

Reyes, Lethbridge & Condon won two awards of merit—one for the Wheaton Youth Center, and the other for homes at the Carverock Springs community.

Other awards of merit winners were Faulkner, Kingsbury & Stenhouse for the Holy Cross Hospital of Silver Spring; Cohen, Hall & Associates for the Munson Hill Towers apartments in Fairfax County, and Deigert and Verkes & Associates for the National Arboretum Headquarters Building.
