
Primary Activity Center: Briggs Chaney Road


Enhance Park and Ride Locations

Mitigate 'Urban Heat Islands'

Prioritize US-29 as a BRT 'Expressway'

Elements of Successful Bus Rapid Transit (BRT):

- Dedicated transit lanes
- Few/No impediments from traffic congestion
- Less policy focus on vehicle capacity
- Integration into existing infrastructure (e.g., 'feeder' buses, sidewalks, payment, etc.)


Prioritize US-29 as a BRT 'Expressway'

Attaining a transit-first approach on US-29:

- Prioritize transit service
- Allow reductions in vehicle congestion standards to benefit movement of people over vehicles
- Explore policies to reduce long-term singleoccupancy vehicle travel





Revisit US-29 Intersections & Interchanges

- **Existing Grade-Separated Interchanges**
 - Retain and Reconfigure to increase active transportation space, safety, and comfort
- **Existing At-Grade Intersections**
 - Do not build highway-style interchanges
 - Explore urban-style, compact grade-separated intersections, if needed
 - Reconfigure to maximize active transportation space, safety, and comfort




Existing Briggs Chaney Road Bridge



Potential Bridge Design Examples










Reconfigure East Randolph Road bridge over US-29






Rendering of possible bridge reconfiguration

Innerand Outer Trail Loops

- Identify with locally relevant name










Neighborhood Greenway Connections



Fairland Recreational / Regional Park

- Take a bi-county approach to planning, operations, and maintenance of Fairland Recreational Park (Montgomery Parks) and Fairland Regional Park (Prince George's Parks & Recreation).
- Preserve and enhance existing natural resources
- Consider additional activities and amenities where most feasible, such as additional pool/water facilities, Agro-Tech Park, sports fields (that cater to diverse cultures), refreshment facilities, etc.




Bi-County Fairland Recreation / Regional Park

What is an Agro-Tech Park?

A regional attraction that teaches and mentors growers. It's where agricultural practices and new technology are studied to make the process of growing more effective and efficient.











Fairland Recreational Park Study

Phase 1


Renovate parking lot to add lights, ADA accessible trails, new soccer court with lights, and renovated basketball courts with lights.

Phase 2

Renovate soccer field from artificial turf into natural turf field with irrigation

Phase 3

- Renovate playground and shelter area into destination adventure playground
- Renovate practice field into community garden/agro garden hub
- Study a new hard surface trail connection to directly link Montgomery side to PG side
- Create a trail connection from Montgomery side to PG side along Greencastle and Old Gunpowder Roads
