

Master Plan Process and Planning Board Briefing





The Rustic Roads Program in County Code

- Chapter 49, Streets and Roads, of the Montgomery County Code contains the laws governing roadways in the county.
- Article 8 of Chapter 49 provides the purpose and definitions of the Rustic Roads Program, plus procedures for the classification, reclassification, maintenance, and improvements of roads in the program.
- Chapter 50, Subdivision of Land, makes brief mentions of rustic roads to protect scenic views and significant features

A Rustic Road

- natural, agricultural, or historic features are predominant
- master planned land use goals and zoning are compatible with a rural/rustic character
- narrow and intended for local use
- low traffic volume
- one of the following characteristics:
 - outstanding natural features
 - o outstanding vistas
 - access to historic resources
- does not have unsafe conditions
- classification does not impair the function or safety of the road network

An Exceptional Rustic Road

- is a rustic road
- must meet all three of the following:
 - contributes significantly to the natural, agricultural, or historic characteristics of the county
 - unusual features found on few other roads
 - would be more negatively affected by improvements or modifications





Background - Timeline

1980	The Functional Master Plan for the Preservation of Agriculture and Rural Open Space in Montgomery County (AROS) is approved and adopted.				
1990	A County Council Task Force publishes <i>A Proposal for a Rural/Rustic Roads Program</i> , which recommended 82 roads for the program.				
1993	The County Council incorporates the Rustic Roads Program into the County Code.				
1994	The Clarksburg Master Plan & Hyattstown Special Study Area designates the first set of rustic roads.				
1996	The Rustic Roads Functional Master Plan is approved and adopted (66 roads added to the program).				
1997-2019	Multiple master plans add 34 roads to the program (and removed one).				


Rustic Roads FMP Update Purpose

- Assess roads which have been nominated to the program
- Complete the incomplete descriptions of roads already in the program
- Consider reclassifications of some existing rustic roads
- Change extents of some rustic roads
- Update existing road descriptions and recommend changes to their significant features



Master Plan Boundary

Except for one road in the northern portion of Midcounty (Game Preserve Road), all roads in the Rustic Roads Program are in the Upcounty area.



Introduction

Vision

Rustic and Exceptional Rustic Roads:

- Significant features of rustic and exceptional roads continue to be preserved
- Rustic roads provide safe and scenic access to existing and future farms and related businesses
- Land uses along rustic roads are not expected to significantly change
- Provide the county with opportunities for heritage tours and economic development
- Impart the county's history to future generations

Roadway Character

- Rustic roads are narrow two-lane roads that follow the natural topography.
- Most rustic roads do not have drainage facilities.
- Preservation of landscape elements along the edges of rustic roads is encouraged in the plan.

Bridges

The bridges on roads in this master plan are varied and offer interesting character and historic value, while still providing functionality for vehicles. Many of the bridges on rustic roads have been identified as significant features.



Significant Features

- The significant features are those elements that need to be preserved when the roads are maintained and improved [Sec. 49-78] (d)], or when a public utility completes work on or near the roads. [Sec. 49-79 (c)]
- Each rustic road and exceptional rustic road must be maintained and improved in a manner that preserves the road's significant features, but this requirement does not preclude improvements to promote safety or movement of farm **equipment**. [Sec. 49-79 (a)]



Equity

- Staff reviewed each of the existing individual road profiles using National Park Service Guidance to updated language in the Plan.
- When possible, highlighted the histories of underrepresented groups and communities in the histories of those road profiles written as a part of this update.
- Considered adding roads to the program from communities established by formerly enslaved people and their descendants.



Road Recommendations

Summary of Criteria Evaluation

Table shows how the road qualifies as rustic or exceptional rustic.



Road Recommendations

This chapter contains all plan recommendations for existing and nominated rustic roads.

- Nominated Roads Recommended as Rustic (17 roads) Existing Rustic Roads with No Changes (33 roads)
- Existing Rustic Roads with Extent Changes or Clarifications (15 roads)
- Existing Rustic Roads with New Road Profiles (24 roads)
- Existing Rustic Roads with Revisions to Significant Features (31 roads)
- Existing Rustic Roads with a Classification Change from Rustic to Exceptional Rustic (16 roads)
- Roads Not Recommended as Rustic (2 existing and 6 nominated roads)

Individual Road Recommendations

- All road recommendations in the master plan are detailed in this section
- Roads with no new recommendations may have other updated details in their road profiles
- Roads previously lacking a full description contain a recommendation to approve the new road profile and significant features

109. With this Plan update, we are providing two entries for the purpose of clarity. The Significant Features, History, Traveling Experience, and Road Characteristics have been modified so that they accompany the appropriate rustic road.

Belle Cote Drive

Recommendations:



Approve the new road profile and significant features.

When this road was designated rustic in 1997, the master plan did not delineate a specific list of significant features along the road. The master plan described Belle Cote Drive as a narrow (10 feet) gravel road with an alignment that consists of vertical and horizontal curves, with very few homes served by the road. The road characteristics called out in the master plan are "an enclosed view of trees and vegetation along its borders, steep downhill grades, and gentle horizontal curves through the woods."

The road also offers views of a creek, which it crosses on a one-lane bridge



Change designation from rustic to exceptional rustic.

The road offers a peaceful drive through forested lands, as well as views of a creek at the road's low point. Belle Cote Drive is one of the few remaining gravel roads in the county. Improving this narrow, gravel road with trees growing close to the road to modern standards would be an extreme change from the road's current state.

Bentley Road

No new recommendations.

Berryville Road

Recommendation:



Approve the new road profile and significant features.

When Berryville Road was designated exceptional rustic, the master plan did not specify the features along the road that were to be preserved. Instead, the master plan contains a table showing the criteria for designation as rustic. Although the table does not show that the road meets the criteria for a rustic designation—that is, that the road has outstanding natural features, outstanding vistas of rural landscape, or follows an historic alignment—this is likely an oversight since this road checks all three boxes.



Rustic Roads as Recommended

- 115 total
 - o 79 Rustic Roads
 - 26 Exceptional **Rustic Roads**
 - 10 with segments that are both rustic and exceptional rustic
- 8 Not recommended as rustic




Traffic and Crash Analysis: Requirements

- Rustic roads must be "low volume [with] traffic volumes that do not detract significantly from the rustic character of the road." [County Code section 49-78(b)(3)]
- "The history of vehicle and pedestrian accidents on the road in its current configuration does not suggest unsafe conditions." [County Code section 49-78(b)(5)]
- County Code does not specify a traffic volume or crash rate above which a rustic designation would be inappropriate.
- 1996 RRFMP guidance suggests **3,000 average weekday trips** as "low volume."
- For the 1996 *RRFMP*, Montgomery Planning and MCDOT reviewed all roads with **eight or more** reported accidents in a five-year period, excluding those where alcohol was a factor.


All County Crashes Heat Map

- Six-year period (2015-2020)
- 67,167 total crashes mapped
- More traffic = more crashes




Rustic Road Crashes Heat Map (Non-Intersection)


- Six-year period (2015-2020)
- 441 total non-intersection crashes mapped on existing and nominated rustic roads
- "Hottest" roads:
 - Old Hundred Road and Frederick Road in Hyattstown
 - Game Preserve Road near Gaithersburg
 - Glen Road, Glen Mill Road, and South Glen Road near Potomac

#2 crash rate for nominated roads: Emory Church Road – 0.72 miles – 351 AADT – 41 crashes (1 non-intersection)




#7 crash rate for existing roads: Game Preserve Road – 1.66 miles - 888 AADT - 71 crashes (34 non-intersection)

- Mineral resources





Implementation and Next Steps

Context


- Rustic roads must be maintained in a manner that provided for safe travel for all modes (including roads designated as snow emergency routes)
- Roads need to provide for the **adequate** movement of farm equipment
- Maintains the integrity of the natural, cultural, and historic character of rustic roads while sustaining the economic viability for agricultural production along them



Farm equipment

Rustic Roads Advisory Committee

- Emphasizes their role in overseeing the program
 - 1. Promote awareness of the Rustic Roads Program;
 - 2. Review and comment on the classification of roads in program;
 - 3. Review and comment on Executive Regulations and other county policies and programs that may affect the program; and
 - 4. Report on June 1 of each even numbered year to the Executive, Council, and Planning Board on the status of the Rustic Roads Program.




